'The open shelving is the perfect transition between the entrance hall and the dining area. As the architectural design is so minimal, lavering art and accessories becomes so much more important. and we wanted to create moments like this for styling,' says Adele.

esigner Adele Lonergan refers to the challenge of reinventing a characterless 1980s townhouse, slap bang in the middle of London, to reflect a warm Los Angeles-meets-Ibiza sanctuary as a 'dream job'. 'We gelled right away with the owner, who is a model and travels a lot, and once we had agreed a vision for the refurbishment, largely focused on natural materials and organic shapes, she was pretty much hands off,' she says.

Adele, together with business partner Maria Lindgren, set up their design studio, Covet Noir, five years ago. The pair, who are known for curating effortlessly timeless interiors, share an affinity for neutrals and a love of mixing new and vintage pieces.

'This house is round the corner from a smart city square, so we had to steer the owner slightly to avoid it going too rustic,' says Adele. 'We went for silk rugs rather than sisal mats and light textiles instead of anything too heavy.' Relaxed and laid-back, the home oozes wall-to-wall high-end sumptuousness, yet still has a hint of beachy vibe thanks to an abundance of warm wood and swathes of floaty drapery that could almost be wafting in the sea breeze.

'The plan was to lean into the modern age of the house - whilst removing its existing heavy joinery and dark timbers - and peel it back to its original shell,' says Adele. 'We were about investing it with clean architectural details, more light and a new softness created by rounding the harsh corners in the house.' Wide plank oak timber floors, bespoke joinery and modern ceiling rafters added much needed warmth and are paired with soft stroke lime wash paint to accentuate all the newly created curves. Aglamorous sweeping staircase, frameless doorways and seamless transitions between rooms also helped to increase the sense of space and flow through the house. And masses of hidden storage - 'the owner has a very big wardrobe' - means the place stays looking streamlined.

Travertine was used where marble might have been employed, wrapped around a peninsula in the kitchen and for splashbacks and worktops, It houses a TV in the living room; serves as basins in the bathrooms and appears majestically in an elliptical bath, carved from one large solid block. 'It had to be craned up to the top floor of the house and weighed over 800 kilos but it was worth the stress,' says Adele, who sited the bath under a window that's not overlooked. 'It's in the ultimate spot for relaxation,' she adds.

As the work progressed, the owner, who had found Covet Noir on Instagram, stayed true to the designers' original concept. 'She definitely had an opinion, but it was mainly in answer to our ideas - which is why you employ a designer, really,' says Adele.

KITCHEN

'There wasn't space to create an island here, so instead we created a peninsula that's used as a bar area for drinking and chatting with friends,' says Adele.

STAIRCASE

'It's the first thing you see as you enter the house, so it sets the tone for the rest of the design,' says Adele. 'The soft, plastered, sweeping curve edge leads the eye up the oak-clad stairs and bounces light around the ground floor.'

LANDING

'Here, we curved the walls to match the plastered staircase so they feel they slot together perfectly. Light from glazed internal doors bounces off them and highlights the texture of the lime wash paint,' says Adele.

DRESSING ROOM

'Our client has an extensive wardrobe, so we had to design a space that was not only beautiful but had tailored storage to ensure everything had a place,' says Adele. 'We didn't want it to feel like a sea of doors, so we introduced reeded glass and full height bronze handles.'

MAIN BEDROOM

'As the house is so architecturally clean, we introduced interest through different forms and textures,' says Adele. 'We love the arms of the chair, which echo the narrative of curves in the house, and the boucle texture makes this strong shape feel cosy and inviting.'

MAIN BEDROOM

'Instead of just a traditional upholstered headboard we wanted to do something a bit more modern, yet still feminine. So we introduced a curtain behind the bed to add a layer of extra softness,' says Adele. 'We love how it juxtaposes with the harder finishes of travertine and alabaster.'
